- o Reasoning is putting your thoughts in order
- Reason without the Holy Spirit
 - Is man's natural mind trying to rule a reality he did not create
 - Will lead man into error
 - Cannot comprehend the things of the Spirit
- Logic is a system of rules governing reasoning
- o Logic
 - is observational
 - reflects God's nature
 - is the science and art of reasoning
- o "Against the man"
 - Ad Hominem
- o You either vote for Joe or you're a bad person.
 - False Dilemma
- Offering a weak but similar argument in order to appear to have defeated the original argument
 - Straw Man
- You shouldn't tell me not to drive fast, since you're always driving fast.
 - Tu Quoque
- o 9 out of 10 mothers choose Jif, so you know it is the best peanut butter.
 - Appeal to popularity/bandwagon
- I don't know a single Chinese person, so there can be one billion Chinese people.
 - Argument to small numbers
- Racial and sexist stereotypes are forms of
 - Hasty generalization
- We cant support this cut or our senior citizens will have to choose between eating and getting their medicine.
 - Appeal to pity
- Once you buy a gun, you'll end up getting shot with it yourself.
 - Slippery Slope
- o I haven't gotten bitten by a single mosquito, clearly they don't like blondes.
 - False Cause
- We know this medicine works; the guy who made it has a PH.D.
 - Appeal to Authority
 - Simply restating the argument with different words
 - Circular Argument/Reasoning
 - Knowledge is power
 - When it is acted upon

- Marxism
 - Advocates the transfer of private property into the hands of a select oligarchy
- The primary framework within which "the left" argues today is
 - Identity politics
 - o A is A
 - Law of Identity
 - o The primary assault of Satan in the Garden
 - Was an assault on Truth
 - A and non-A cannot be true at the same time in the same relationship
 - Law of Non-Contradiction
 - The Law of the Excluded Middle states that
 - A statement is either true of false
 - There is no "in-between"
 - If a statement is half-truth then it is false

 - By the vessel in which it operates
